This call invites you nominate colleagues for the Ruth Zemke Lecture in Occupational Science (RZLOS). The person selected to deliver this honorary lecture will give his or her speech at the 2019 SSO:USA Conference (conference site is soon to be determined). The Ruth Zemke Lecture in Occupational Science is an honorary lecture dedicated to the spirit of questing intellectual curiosity expressed by Dr. Ruth Zemke in her work within occupational science. The intent of the Lecture is to offer selected individuals a unique opportunity to challenge the thinking of occupational scientists at the research conferences of the Society for the Study of Occupation: USA. Criteria for selection include significant contributions to occupational science and a demonstrated commitment to building a community of scholars in the discipline. At the Lecture, the honoree is presented with a kaleidoscope, a favorite object of Dr. Zemke’s, to symbolize the simplicity, complexity, multiplicity of views, and ever-changing nature of the discipline of occupational science.

**Primary criteria for selection of the Ruth Zemke Lecturer in Occupational Science:**

1. Significant contributions to the occupational science literature
2. Intellectual curiosity and vision in relation to occupation and occupational science
3. Contribution to the building of the occupational science community
